

From the Rector's Desk...

You Don't Know What You've Got Till It's Gone

I was thinking back to when I was a sophomore in High School the other day. No, really, I can remember back that far. It was a time of awakening for some people as to the cost of unfettered progress across the country. Especially here in New Jersey, farms and woodlands were being leveled at a record pace, being replaced by Malls, shopping centers, amusement parks, suburban housing, (think Levittown) and the like. Thus, was born the music genre of folk protest music. One of my favorites artists was Joni Mitchell. Joni saw the consequences of our progressive actions and wrote a song called "Big Yellow Taxi" in 1970. It quickly became a hit, first in Canada (her home country) then Australia and the UK. Eventually it hit the charts here in the states. The popularity of this song came from many truths contained in the lyrics. My favorite lyric was:

*"Don't it always seem to go
That you don't know what you've got
'Til it's gone
They paved paradise
Put up a parking lot..."*

We all seem to take things for granted until they're taken away from us, then suddenly we realize how critical those things were to our happiness, even our survival; and we wish they were back.

This is exactly what has occurred with our faith life because of the Coronavirus. Before the virus we took our community life as members of the body of Christ for granted. Of course, we could go to church and have Communion on Sunday and even on Thursday if we wanted to. No big deal missing a week, we could just go next week. And the Daily Office, that was just for the clergy. But now



we have had our buildings closed, gatherings forbidden, and visits restricted. Suddenly there is a thirst, even a vital need, to find a way to receive the body and blood of Jesus, to have a blessing by our priest, to meet and have table fellowship at coffee hour.

I hope, when it is all finally done, that I sing because I have used this time to allow my heart and mind to slow down and to find the quiet restful place that comes from knowing the One True God who is still in control of this world and our personal lives.

It is in this place that I can sit and talk with God face to face. I can enjoy our time together knowing that in the end of all of this, I am going to sing with more feeling and more joy.

Yes, we really don't know what we've got till it's gone! But, with the severity of the situation there comes a moment of Christian Hope.

First, we realize that we may have lost our communal services, but we have not lost the presence of Jesus in our lives. "I will never leave you nor forsake you;" and "I will be with you even to the end of the age;" are both promises that Jesus has made to us in his Gospels. Jesus is present to us through his Holy Spirit, through prayer, reading our bible, and even talking to our friends on the telephone (or texting, or e-mail, or Zoom, or...) Jesus, and by extension his body, the Church, cannot be separated from us.

Second, the temporary loss of our physical building and bodily proximity has caused us to find new ways to continue as Church. Many of us have learned to use Zoom and YouTube to meet for services and even a virtual coffee hour on Sunday mornings. We have been forced into new ways to contribute to the work of the church using digital payments from our banks and other means of meeting our pledges. Most importantly, though, we have learned the importance of Daily Community Prayer as we Episcopalians began using the Daily Office together for the first time in my memory. We meet every day at 7:00pm on our parish YouTube channel and read Evening Prayer Rite II. Five of those days I officiate, Fridays and Sunday evenings Susan Clarke officiates. We pray for our church family, victims of the virus, and all matters of importance to us, even for our pets! On Sunday mornings we worship on Zoom. To this point we have used Morning Prayer Rite II, but we are hoping to introduce the Holy Eucharist with spiritual reception from our Church sanctuary soon.

Finally, we know that this situation with the Coronavirus is only temporary, but our lessons, God willing, will not be! We will move forward from this difficult situation into a renewed effort to be the best Church that we can. We will bring forward what we have learned about technology and continue to use it to reach out to those unable to join us physically in our church building for worship. We will incorporate new methods of giving into our list of tools to help our Parish grow. We will continue to offer opportunities to pray the Daily Office, even when we are receiving the Eucharist once or twice a week at God's altar. We will come out the other side of this pandemic a better, stronger, more effective and experienced Church than when we entered it over two months ago.

To Join us for Evening Prayer: Go to "ststephenswhitingnj.org" on your browser. - scroll to the bottom of the page. - press the red button. - then click on the thumbnail picture that says "live". You can view any past services by clicking on their thumbnail. They all have dates.

To Join us for Sunday Morning Zoom Service: Download the Zoom App onto your computer or smart phone. - contact Fr. Paul and make sure he has your e-mail address. - Watch for your e-mail invitation 24-48 hours before the service. - in the invitation you will see a link that says "Join Zoom Meeting," Click on it at 9:45am Sunday morning and you will be taken to the service.

God Bless us all as we follow His lead through this difficult time,

Each of us in our own way have learned to cope with the current COVID-19 situation. It is our hope that you are well and in good spirits.

Because our church is closed, we miss our services, fellowship, Bible Studies, and more. Just as your life continues on and your expenses do too, so does the church's life and expenses continue even though we are not physically here.

The COVID-19 pandemic has greatly impacted our fundraisers, group meetings, coffee hours, and programs along with our ability to worship together as Christians on Sundays and Thursdays. Loose plate, occasional giving, and rental income has ceased. The treasurer's office is grateful to everyone that continues to send in their pledges and special envelopes, such as for Easter and other holy days, as well as a little extra donation. Thank you for caring and sharing.

You probably are wondering how to continue to pledge to the church since it is closed. You can mail in your numbered envelope with your check enclosed. If you wish, you may include multiple weeks in one envelope and one check. The face of the envelope gives you spaces to tell us how to apply your check. You may also set up automatic payments via your bank. The "account number" the bank will ask for is your Envelope Number. Special gifts of any size are also welcome. Our current expenses include: building maintenance, electric, gas, monthly loan payments on our heating system and fire alarm, payroll, printer, office supplies, postage and permits, building insurance, and pledges to the Diocese. The building insurance is our biggest bill at \$2445, and is due on June 1st. There are also new expenses that the COVID-19 has directly impacted, such as software for online worship, and remote access to our church computer. In addition, there are future needs that will get moving when we return to worship. As you can see we have a lot of needs.

It has impacted our ministry and mission in Whiting. With your help, we will continue to provide a place to worship and more. If you need spiritual help, call Fr. Paul at: (609) 502- 8233. Join us on YouTube at 7PM every night for Evening Prayer, and on Zoom every Sunday at 10AM for Morning Prayer and "coffee hour". Other possibilities for services will be forthcoming. 




