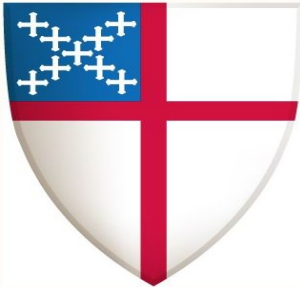

News from the Treasurer's Desk

Things have been very busy in the Treasurer's office! Sandy has been busy clearing out some of the file cabinets, making some interesting discoveries in the process. Seeing some of the old records that were kept by hand makes me very appreciative of the technology available today. The technology may have changed, but the problems remain the same.

Stewardship season is coming up shortly. You'll be hearing about different aspects of stewardship. Considering my role as Treasurer, you can probably guess that I will be bringing up the financial side of it. The Financial presentation is scheduled for October 6th after both services. The most memorable statement I've heard in connection with the financial side of stewardship is this: "Don't give until it hurts; give until it feels good."

We've had a few unexpected surprises over the last couple of months. First, we had the conversion from oil to gas, which was something we had expected and arranged for a \$20,000 loan to cover. What we didn't expect less than six weeks later, was a required upgrade/replacement of our fire suppression system to the tune of \$15,500. This resulted in a second loan. The combined monthly payment for both loans is approximately \$750. Before the first payment of loan #2 was even paid, the air conditioning and heating units in the office stopped working and are not repairable. The cost to replace them is just under \$9,000. We are managing as best we can with fans for now but will need to have this work done before we need heat this fall and winter. In my opinion, we cannot support another capital loan.

All of that is in addition to the other past due bills that we are working to manage.

I am trusting in the Lord that we will get through this. I am also confident in the faith, commitment, and enthusiasm of this congregation to support our obligations as best you can. One of the ways you can do that is to encourage new people to "come and see". When I run into people in the check-out line, or the doctor's office, even at Physical Therapy, I'll talk up our fundraising events and/or invite people to church. I've been quite surprised at how many people don't know that we're here!

Two more ideas to help us in our fundraising efforts:

- * Are you an Amazon shopper? Sign up to support us at "smile.amazon.com". The first time you use that site, you will be prompted to choose a charity to support. Please enter your search criteria exactly like this (no punctuation): St Stephens Episcopal Church of Whiting New Jersey
- * Invite friends and family members to do the same. Over time, St. Stephen's will receive a portion of your purchase as a donation. Every little bit helps!
- ◆ Do you have an account at Investors Bank? Investors Bank's Care2Share program currently is donating approximately \$200 per quarter to St. Stephen's. This comes from customer accounts that are "linked" to St. Stephen's. We have no idea whose accounts they are, or how much is in them, but we sure do appreciate that quarterly income.

Saint Stephen's Bowling Ministry

Saint Stephen's is now offering a brand new and improved King of the Hill Bowling tournament at Playdrome Lanes in Toms River.

We have reduced the entry fee to just \$35.00 per bowler which breaks down as follows: \$20 towards the prize fund, \$12 Playdrome, \$3 St. Stephen's donation. The tournament is currently offered the last Sunday of each month, year 'round with the exception of May—we are discussing the possibility of expanding the tournament to twice a month, and we anticipate feedback from our bowlers. The tournament is open to all—men, women, and junior bowlers.

Our format is 3-game block followed by a cut to the top 7 bowlers to advance and join the King in a bracketed, single-elimination game 2nd round of competition. Payout is the total prize fund returned 100% with 60% to the King and 40% to second place. In addition, we have a championship trophy to the new King each month. Anyone who rolls a perfect game (300) can win a medal for outstanding bowling skill!

For fun, the qualifying rounds offer side pots for High Game & High Series for \$5 per pot; these also pay out 1st and 2nd place. Bowlers with no established league or tournament average come in at 175 for men & 165 for women.

Junior bowlers may enter and compete in the tournament, but they are advised not to accept any cash awards so as not to jeopardize their amateur status. Junior bowlers may compete for the championship trophy and any other offers from the bowling center that may be available to Junior bowlers..

We invite you to come out to Playdrome Lanes to see us, whether you are a competitive bowler, recreational bowler, or you simply enjoy spectating, there is fun for all. We will see YOU at the lanes!

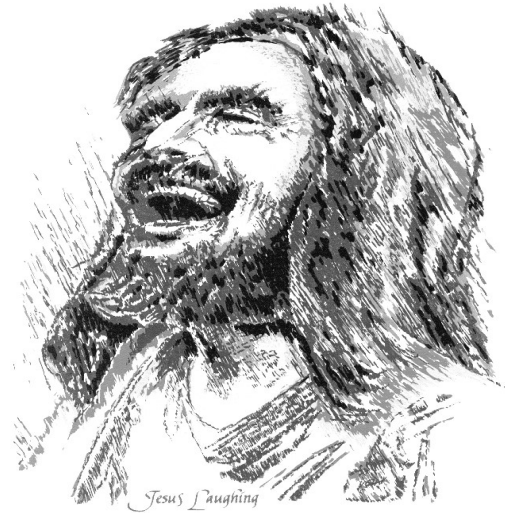

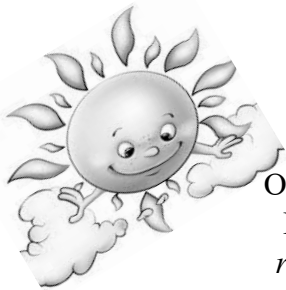

Come join us on **Wednesday, September 4 @ 10 a.m.**

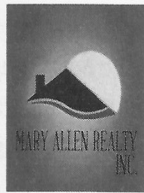
Our speaker will be Ben Ackerman from Jake's Branch Country Park.

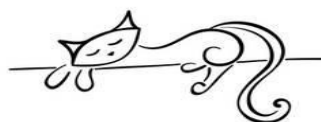

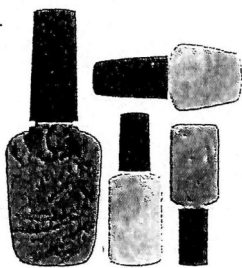

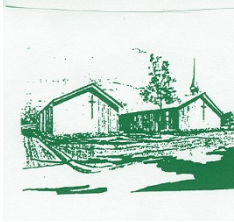
