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
From the Rector's Desk...

Easter Triumph Easter Joy

I was just remembering the first time I viewed "The Passion of the Christ" with my wife, Priscilla and my eldest son, Andrew; it was Holy week 2004. It is hard to put into words the feelings and emotions that this powerful film stirred in us. As many times as I have read the scriptures, heard the story, or listened to sermons about the Passion, it was not until I saw this suffering of our Lord with my own eyes and heard His anguish with my own ears, that I came to realize just how great a sacrifice He made for you and for me. The film was able to draw us into a sense of actually being with Jesus as he fulfilled the scriptures and gave His life for our sins.

We felt almost as if we were traveling with Him and His disciples, watching His humiliation, beating, and crucifixion. However, it is not good for us to just feel sorry for Jesus' suffering. We must be willing to believe that what He did was for a purpose. It was part of a plan that God the Father set in motion at the beginning of creation. It was done so that the price of our sins, which is death and damnation, was paid in full. Why was Jesus suffering so profound? Because our sinfulness knows no bounds.

We put ourselves before God and our neighbors every day. We are unwilling to give our time, talent, and treasure to God unless we can dictate what it is we want in return. We refuse to trust his word, follow His commandments, and give Him our lives. In short, we, like His original disciples that fateful week, believe that Jesus is powerless to overcome this world that mocks Him and we hide ourselves lest we too share His fate.



As I watched the final moments of the movie and saw the body of Jesus laid in the arms of His mother, Mary, I felt alone and beaten. I was actually afraid that the story of The Passion would end right there—with the body of my Lord, lifeless and powerless being laid in His tomb. I was feeling what Peter and John felt.

But, we must also know that from that suffering and death came salvation and eternal life though the Resurrection of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

The people of God sing. The role of music in worship is biblical. After escaping from the Egyptians and crossing the Red Sea the people of Israel sang a song to the Lord (*Exodus 15*). Singing was part of Israel's formal worship in both tabernacle and temple (*1 Chronicles 6:31-32, 16:42*). The Psalms bear rich testimony that in joy and sorrow, in praise and lament, the faithful raise their voices in song to God. Hymn singing was practiced by Jesus and His disciples (*Matthew 26:30*). The Apostle Paul instructed the Colossians, "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God. And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him (*Colossians 3:16-17*). Matthew 26:30 says "And when they had sung a hymn, they went out into the Mount of Olives." They sang a hymn as they were preparing to leave the last supper. I wish that I knew what they had sung. The next verses in Chapter 26 of Matthew take us to Gethsemane preceding the betrayal, the trial, and the crucifixion.

The disciples had no idea what was about to happen but Jesus did.

We do know what was coming for Christ and His followers and we are so very grateful. We can sing those songs of worship that remind us of what He did for us and that draw our hearts to Him. Don't forget to lift your voice throughout each day and sing of His love for you and your love for Him.

The choir has prepared some beautiful Lenten anthems in hopes that you will be lifted in your spirit toward a deeper relationship with Jesus. We would love to have you share your beautiful voice with us.

Amish Baked Oatmeal

This wholesome family favorite can be prepared in advance and tastes a lot like a cinnamon oatmeal cookie. I typically take a

minimalist approach, but the recipe is easy to customize through the addition of raisins, nuts, etc. If doubling the recipe, use a 9×13 baking dish, adding a few minutes to the cooking time as needed.

Yield: 6-8 servings Ingredients:

- 2 large eggs
- 1/2 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/2 tablespoon baking powder
- 1/2 tablespoon vanilla
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/4 cup butter, melted
- 1 1/4 cups milk
- (regular, almond, etc.—choose your favorite) 3 cups old-fashioned rolled oats

Instructions:

Grease an 8-inch square baking dish or other 1 1/2-quart casserole and set aside.

In a mixing bowl, whisk the eggs and then add the brown sugar, baking powder, vanilla, cinnamon, and salt. Mix well—you don't want any lumps.

Whisk in the melted butter and milk. Add the oats and stir to thoroughly combine. Transfer the mixture to the prepared baking dish.

At this point, you can cover and refrigerate overnight or as little as one hour. (This gives the oats time to absorb some of the liquid.) When ready to bake, allow the oatmeal to sit at room temperature while the oven preheats to 350 degrees F. Bake, uncovered, for 30 minutes (give or take a few depending on oven and proportions of selected baking dish) or until just set in the middle.

Serve warm with milk or yogurt, fruit, and/or other favorite oatmeal toppings. Add a drizzle of maple syrup or a sprinkle of brown sugar if more sweetness is preferred. Baked oatmeal can also be enjoyed cold or at room temperature and may be served like a muffin, with no toppings.

Notes

For breakfast at-the-ready, I have gotten into the habit of baking the oatmeal in the evening and allowing it to sit at room temperature overnight. After breakfast, I cover and refrigerate any leftovers to better maintain freshness. The baked oatmeal will keep for about a week in the refrigerator and may be frozen.




