

Don't you just love the music of the Christmas season? Between the services on Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, and the first Sunday after Christmas, we sang almost all of the familiar hymns and carols in our Hymnal. The congregational singing of the hymns prior to the main service on Christmas Eve was enthusiastic and inspirational. The solos interspersed among the carols also helped prepare us for the service celebrating the birth of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

As we enter the New Year, I hope some people show an interest in participating in the music programs in the Church. Our Chime Choir can accompany our Gradual Hymn, "Word of God, Speak," if we have four or more chimers (plus me) available. However, we cannot play an anthem with fewer than six chimers – I can't play a "position" in our anthems because I must conduct the group to keep everyone together!

We have been without two of our voice choir members for a while due to injury or surgery.

It is almost impossible to present an anthem with just five or fewer people. Most of the choral music in our "library" is intended for a choir with more singers than we have. I'm trying to gather some music that can be done by just a small number of singers or the choir together with the congregation. Nevertheless, it would be helpful if we had a few more full-time singers and ringers in the choirs!

As we enter a new year, I hope some of you will consider participating in one of our choirs.

News from the Creasurer's Desk

Hi from the Treasurer's Desk!

- 1. 2018 is almost over, so it's time to reflect on our accomplishments this year. Since this is the Treasurer's column, so I've decided to identify the many different ways our members have helped our finances this year. We try to keep our pledges (Operating Budget Pledge, Building Maintenance Pledge, and Capital Campaign Pledge) up-to-date. This is the most important way to help us to prepare for our financial future.
 - 2. We give various donations to the church and, if we wish, we specify how these donations are to be spent.
 - **3.** Some of us give "in-kind" donations. These gifts are donations of new items for church use. Some donated items for our event treasure auctions or for food for these events. Office supplies can also be donated. In order to get tax deductions for these donations, you must present your receipt to the Treasurer's Office and include information what the donation is and how it is to be used.
 - **4.**Others remember loved ones or celebrate birthdays or anniversaries by donating money for Altar Flowers, Sanctuary Candles, or Memorials. There are special envelopes in the Narthex for these gifts. The money donated for Altar Flowers and Sanctuary Candles is given to the Altar Guild. Memorials get listed in our Sunday Bulletin showing the donor's name and the person or person being memorialized. The family of the deceased person will receive a note informing them about the gift. Memorials may be designated for a particular purpose. Some have been used to buy liturgical items, others were designated for Our Daily Bread or Hungry Paws pantries. Several gifts were designated for choir and music related supplies.
 - **5.** Bequests are gifts that come from the settlement an estate from parishioners who include St. Stephen's Church in their wills. Like memorials, these gifts may be designated for a particular use. Non-designated memorials are normally divided equally between our endowment funds and one of our three pledging funds (Operating, Maintenance or Capital). Endowments are the building blocks necessary for the long-term survival of our church.
 - **6.** Fr. Paul has a Discretionary Fund account which is used to help those in need. It may provide temporary housing, payment of a heating bill, or food for the hungry. You may place these donations in an envelope labeled "Discretionary Fund". Donations may also be placed in the basket on the table in the back of the church.
 - 7. A fun way to help our church financially is to support our many church activities. Profits from these events both help our finances increase and increase the development of fellowship with our neighborhood. We can buy extra tickets for various events and donate them to the pantry to distribute to pantry clients. Just give the tickets to the Treasurer's office first and we will pass them on to the pantry managers.
 - **8.** Also remember that we benefit financially by being friendly and smiling at visitors. This helps us build our membership. We have the best and most diverse activities in Whiting. We are known and we are growing!

These are wonderful ways to invest in the future of our wonderful church. BUT ... enough with the money talk ...
