

From the Rector's Desk...

The Perfect Saint

In my November column for the Crestwood Sun I talk about the origin of Halloween. In that column I mention church saints. Most people think of saints as people who are gifted with super human abilities to resist temptations that would lead others into certain damnation; and that same power allows them to perform miracles of healing. They see saints as living perfect, selfless lives that make them stand out before God and His church. Saints always put others before themselves. Saints are not gluttons. Saints never sin. Granted, some saints are like that: Mother Theresa, Padre Pio, Joan of Arc, and St. John the Evangelist. But all saints are themselves far more human than their stained-glass images that we gaze upon in church or their depictions in the paintings and statues of

Just look at members of the "Big Twelve". Peter denied Jesus three times when he could have stood up for him (Matt. 26:69-75; Mark 14:66-72; Luke 22:54-62; John 8:17-27). Ten out of the twelve ran and hid as Jesus was crucified, caring more about their own lives than his (John 20:19). Thomas doubted the veracity of the news that his brothers and sisters shared with him that, "He has Risen!" (John 20:24-25) Only John remained faithful to Jesus throughout his passion (John 19:25-27).

In addition, some of his other disciples who were very close to the twelve apostles believed that Jesus had failed to live up to his claim to be the Messiah and left town for new and safer situations (Luke 24:13-35).

Well, what about their "super powers?" you ask. Just because there are places in the New Testament where Apostles or Disciples perform miracles does not mean that THEY are doing anything. It is only through prayer and the power of the Holy spirit that miracles occur. As it is born out in the case of "A Boy Possessed by a Spirit"; the Apostles could not drive out the spirit and Jesus had to be brought in to get the job done. Then Jesus tells them all that is needed is faith and prayer (Mark 9:14-29; Matt. 17:14-21; Luke 9:37-43a).



Looking at all this should prompt us to the realization that no saints are perfect and that we have no excuse to deny our own sainthood as baptized members of the body of Christ. Yes! We are saints of God: sinful, afraid, doubting saints.

You can meet them in school, on in lanes, or at sea, in church, or in trains, or in shops, or at tea; for the saints of God, are just folk like me, and I mean to be one too.

May we all have a blessed All Saints' Day and bask in the joy of "perfect" sainthood, in Jesus name we pray... AMEN!
